

As we begin our year of 2022, there are a few club events coming up that you will want to add to your calendars.


However first I would like to start out the new year by announcing the results of our recent Club Officer Elections for 2022. Please note the current roster of our newly elected 2022 club officers:

Vice President- Lori Sue Anderson


Treasurer - Jill Champley

Sandy peaks

Last month, I gave you information on the new Chadron State College YRE. Let me tell you about the other two new events in Northwest Nebraska.

The White River Trail

Soon to be part of The Great American Rail-Trail, the White River Trail runs along a former Chicago and North Western Railroad line, with stunning views of tree-covered buttes in the Pine Ridge area. This crushed rock trail connects Crawford, NE to Fort Robinson State Park. This is an out-and-back walk that can be started either at Fort Robinson or at Crawford City Park.

Western Nebraska's premier state park, Fort Robinson, has more than 22,000 acres of exquisite Pine Ridge scenery, exceptional lodging, loads of fun-time activities, scenic camping and the park's own buffalo and longhorn herds. It is a park filled with history, from the surrender of Crazy Horse, the garrisoning of the Buffalo Soldiers and its use as a German prisoner-of-war camp. There is a day use fee charged if you park at Fort Robinson State Park.

Established in 1886 as the Fremont Elkhorn and Missouri Valley Railroad pushed west, Crawford grew from the need to support the soldiers at nearby Fort Robinson with supplies and entertainment. The town was named after Lt. Emmett Crawford, who had been stationed at the fort, but was killed in Mexico during the Indian Wars. Crawford is located in the scenic Pine Ridge area of Nebraska and is known as the "Big Game Capital of Nebraska". The City Park is home to the Old West Trail Rodeo which takes place on the 4th of July and celebrated its 75th year in 2021. Parking is free in the park.

Agate Fossil Bed National Monument

This semi-remote park offers the opportunity to explore two trails that lead to fossil dig sites. The park is surrounded by prairie grasslands offering the opportunity to view Pronghorn Antelope and other wildlife. The visitor center has a diorama showcasing mounted skeletons that represent the Miocene Epoch mammals that were found in this area.

The Fossil beds trail is paved and fairly level. It takes you up to and around the two primary excavation sites for the fossils you saw in the visitor center.

The Bone Cabin (on 10 K route)

About midway between the visitor center and Fossil Hills is an unpaved one-mile side trail that leads west to Harold J. Cook's homestead cabin. Restored to what it looked like in 1910, while Harold and his wife Eleanor still lived there, the "Bone" cabin was used after 1914 as the temporary residence for scientists who worked the fossil quarries. The American Museum of Natural History's lead excavator, Albert "Bill" Thomson, lived there whenever conducting field work in the bone bed in the late 1910s

and early 1920s.

Harold J. Cook's history is fascinating. He grew up on the 04 Ranch (which became part of the Agate Springs Ranch) in western Nebraska and became interested in the fossils, when, as a child, he helped paleontologists dig there. He became a distinguished paleontologist. His father was a good friend to Red Cloud, and often invited the Lakota to come down and hunt on his ranch, after they were confined to the Pine Ridge. Cook's memoir includes accounts of Red Cloud and his band, as well as various incidents related to attempts to homestead in the Sandhills region after the Kinkaid Act was passed in 1904. His memoir *Tales of the 04 Ranch* was written as a sequel to his father's memoir, *Fifty Years on the Old Frontier*, 1923. The Cooks were direct descendants of British sea captain and explorer James Cook.

The Federal Government acquired land from the Cooks and established Agate Fossil Beds National Monument on the site of the old 04 ranch in 1997.

To visit more fossils, you can take a short drive further west on the River Road to the **Daemonelix Trail**. (Watch for the parking area on the north side of the road). Not part of the Volkswalk, this trail is shorter, made of crushed gravel, and takes you past several in-situ Daemonelix fossils. This one mile trail features exhibits of the spiral corkscrew fossil of the Paleocastor, an ancient land beaver that lived here in the Miocene.

All three of the walks in Northwest Nebraska are available via the online start box or at the physical start box at the Chadron Chamber of Commerce. White River is about 20 miles from Chadron and Agate Fossil Bed is about 65 miles from Chadron.

Chadron State College and White River are year round events. Agate Fossil Beds is a seasonal event.

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
